On the eve of ANZAC Day, the Western Australian Premier announced that 19 October would be set as War Widows Day in Western Australia. This follows the announcement on the 16 March that the South Australian Government will also commemorate War Widows Day on 19 October each year. While War Widows Day will be recognised in a small way in Brisbane this year, the board wants each

## NATIONAL PRESIDENT REPORT



It is wonderful to be able to bring you all the great news that both AWW SA and AWW WA have been able to work with their respective parliaments to have a War Widows Day declared in their states. This means that QLD, NSW, SA and WA will formally recognise the contribution and

personal sacrifices of war widows and widowers with an annual day of commemoration on 19 October.

We look forward to WW ACT achieving this same result and having a declaration of this special day in ACT. Then it is up to AWW to get Victoria, Tasmania and NT involved and make this day a National War Widows Day.

I am happy to report that we have had an offer from a Victorian war widow to re-activate a war widows' group in Melbourne. If you know of anyone who may be interested in being part of this group, please contact AWW on 0427 735 871.

I would like to thank all the war widows who represented Australian War Widows at their state or subbranch level in laying wreaths or attending an Anzac Day Service in their area. This is an important occasion where we can pay tribute to our loved ones' dedication, service and sacrifice.

You will have heard that there are some changes proposed to the Veterans Legislation and many of you may have contributed to discussions around this issue. The proposed new system aims to establish a single ongoing Act (MRCA) but grandparenting all existing arrangements to ensure there is no reduction in entitlements currently being or previously

received by veterans/widows. AWW has given feedback about the proposed legislative reform and in particular, requesting that the language used is clear and simple and that the changes are articulated clearly and timely to the veteran community.

The National Council met in Canberra in May to review our vision and purpose and how we can best support our many war widows in Australia. One of our main concerns is to activate AWW in those states who do not currently have a war widow's organisation

We are very pleased that the DVA publication of "Vet Affairs" has allocated additional space for War Widows to advertise our activities and promote our organisation.

I have continued to attend ESORT meetings, the Budget briefing at DVA in May, an RSL Forum for Ex-Service Organisations in Sydney, webinar sessions regarding the proposed changes to Veterans' Legislation and liaised with Alison Frame (Secretary DVA) regarding issues affecting war widows.

Along with the AWWQ President, Judy Smith, I attended a Coronation Dinner for His Majesty King Charles III and Her Majesty Camilla Queen Consort at the Tattersall's club in Brisbane. Do you all recall that Jessie Vasey attended the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II?

I will continue to represent all war widows in Australia at any relevant meeting or occasion.

It is a great honour for me to be able to do this.


## INCREASE IN FUNDING FOR HOME CARE PACKAGES

Following the Australian Government commitment to increase the wages of aged care workers and the subsequent 15% award increase, the government has also increased funding for the home care packages by 11.9% from 1 July 2023. This will ensure that recipients of HCP can continue to receive the same number of hours of services that they were receiving before the wage increases.

## VIETNAM WAR COMMEMORATIVE MEDALLION AND CERTIFICATE

To acknowledge the 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War, the Department of Veterans' Affairs will produce a Commemorative Medallion and Certificate of Commemoration

The medallion and certificate will be made available to every living veteran, widows of veterans and other family members of veterans of the Vietnam War. Please note that only one medallion is available per Vietnam War veteran. While Australia can never repay the debt we owe to the 60,000 who served in Vietnam, this medallion and certificate are a small but meaningful way to honour their service and to recognise the sacrifice of those who never returned home.

The obverse design will feature the Commonwealth Coat of Arms with 'Vietnam War' inscribed at the top and "Australia remembers' at the bottom. The medallion reverse design will feature words of thanks at the bottom with the years 1962-73 inscribed at the top to represent the years in which Australia was involved in the Vietnam War. The medallion also features a UH-1 Iroquois "Huey" Helicopter, a depiction of HMAS Sydney (III) "Vung Tau Ferry" and an Australian solider holding an SLR.



The medallion will be presented in a display case and will include a card that explains the design and contains a brief expression of thanks.

The design of the commemorative certificate will complement the medallion. The design includes the Commonwealth Coat of Arms, 'Australia Remembers' wording and includes the signature of both the Governor-General and the Prime Minister.

The certificate will be contained within its own folder that will allow for independent display, framing and mounting.

Thanks to the generous sponsorship of the Eastern Star Foundation, we are proud to offer our members a transport assistance program.





These men and women were told to go to a country they knew nothing about


None of them did complain or shout

## PENSION RISE

As pension rates are calculated on a daily basis, the pension paid on payday 23 March 2023 will be paid partly at the old rate and partly at the new rate. The first full payment at the new rates of pension will be payday 6 April 2023.

The maximum rate of single service pension will rise by \$37.50 to \$1,064.00 per fortnight and the maximum rate for couples will increase by \$28.20 to \$802.00 per fortnight (each).

The Special Rate of Disability Compensation Payment (T&PI payment) will increase by \$59.04 to \$1,676.20 per fortnight. The Extreme Disablement Adjustment (EDA) rate will increase by \$31.90 to \$904.60 per fortnight and the 100 per cent General Rate of Disability Compensation Payment will increase by \$20.50 to \$581.90 per fortnight.

The pension paid to war widow(er)s will increase by \$38.20 to \$1,082.50 per fortnight (including the

energy supplement), while the ceiling rate of the income support supplement will rise to \$321.10 per fortnight.

Payments will also increase certain benefits under the Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 2004 (MRCA). The weekly MRCA wholly dependent partner payment will increase by \$19.10 to \$541.25. This is paid fortnightly (\$1,082.50).

The indexation factor used to index pensions each March and September can be based on either the Consumer Price Index (CPI), the Pensioner and Beneficiary Living Cost Index (PBLCI) or Male Total Average Weekly Earnings (MTAWE). For 20 March 2023, the indexation was driven by CPI.

## MY AGED CARE

Dear members,

Many of our members who have a gold card and are entitled to a host of services from DVA will ask whether they are allowed to register with My Aged Care without jeopardising their DVA entitlements. The answer to their concern is that all DVA gold card holders are entitled to register with My Aged Care provided they are over 65 years.

The second concern shared by many members is why should they registering with My Aged Care given most of their needs are met by DVA. The reason we are encouraging all our members over 65 to register with My Aged Care is because they offer services that DVA do not offer such as assisted shopping when a support worker collects you from your home and takes you shopping, or drives you to a social event like meeting your friends for coffee, or visits you in your home for a chat, or helps you prepare your favourite meal. These services become more important once you stop driving or when your family or friends move away. There are also a host of other services offered by My Aged Care but that will meet each individuals unique situation.

To register with My Aged Care simply call 1800 200 422. Ideally, you would want to call My Aged Care when you have a family member visit you so that you can arrange for them to be your representative on My Aged Care. Both parties just need to give verbal permission to My Aged Care. This will mean that your chosen family member can talk to My Aged Care to arrange services and assessments when you are unable to, when you are in hospital or sick in bed. For the same reason, we also recommended that your family member also register with Veterans Home Care. This can also be telephonically arranged by calling VHC on 1300 550 450.

My Aged Care will take approximately 45 minutes to answer the phone so I suggest making a cup of tea before calling and decide how you will occupy your time while you wait. Maybe you are able to put the phone on loud speaker while you wait and continue chatting with your family member or doing an activity you enjoy. This will hopefully put you in a positive frame of mind when your call is picked up. The staff at My Aged Care are very helpful and professional. They will need to collect information from you so be ready to share your details with them – DVA Gold card number, medical history etc. You will need to request that you would like a representative added to your profile. You can make your representative your primary representative or just your representative. If your family member becomes your primary representative then MAC will call them first should they want to contact you. If the family member or friend is just your representative then MAC will call you first. Your representatives will receive a copy of all correspondence sent to you.

I hope this is useful and I look forward to hearing your feedback on your experience with registering with My Aged Care!

## VALE HEATHER JEAN HUNTER

Heather was born at Gympie on 29th April, 1924. Along with her parents and siblings, she lived on a farm at Amamoor and started school there. At a very young age Heather lost her father. Her mother packed up the family and they moved to Murgon. It was there Heathers mother had a guest house and Heather continued her education until she was thirteen. She had various jobs, including helping her mother at the guest house.

At eighteen years of age Heather realised she could join the Army. She got herself to Sydney in quick time and enlisted in the Australian Womens Army Service. She served in Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane and Townsville. Following her discharge at the end of the war, someone asked her what was she going to do now. Her answer was "find a man and get married", and that she did. She met Bill Hunter in Mackay, got married and had her family. They had two daughters, Lorraine and Christine.

Heather and Bill had a great life together. She was by his side all the way, supporting him in the positions of employment he held with Ansett Airways. They moved to Brisbane where they built, lived in and then sold several homes. During this time Heather belonged to many organisations and worked very hard for the community. Their last move was to the Sunshine Coast.

Following Bills death, Heather became a War Widow. She was a member of Nambour Guild, but owing to the distance to travel, she and a few other ladies broke away and formed Maroochydore Guild in May 1989. Sadly, the President of Maroochydore passed away six month later and Heather took on the role of President for six years. During that six years she worked extremely hard to raise funds. She organised many bus trips, many of which were overnight ones, also fashion parades, lamington drives and trading tables at the meetings.

Heather always said she would never leave her home. However, at the grand age of 98 she decided enough was enough and decided to go into aged care. However there were conditions attached to her decision. The facility had to be near where her home was so that her friends from War Widows and the Mouldy Oldies could come and visit her. The other condition was, please ring first before you come-I could be out on a bus trip!! Heather was a member of Kawana RSL and also a very much loved member of the Mouldy Oldies. You had to be over 90 to qualify to be a member.

Heather settled in very well at Tri Care, Kawana. She told everyone the food is wonderful and you get a glass of wine at dinner time. Sadly she was only a resident there for about ten days when she suffered a stroke. Heather passed away peacefully on 6th April, 2023, two weeks short of her 99th Birthday.

Rest in Peace Heather. You will always have a special place in our hearts.



## DETECT A SCAM

Scams can happen when malicious organisations or people try to trick you into providing them with your personal information. These scams normally occur via email, text messages, and sometimes, even phone calls. Cybercriminals may claim to be your bank, Australian Tax Office or any other organisation that you normally provide your information to. To avoid falling prey to these scams, we have suggested some steps to detect potential cybercriminals.

#### SUSPICIOUS CORRESPONDENCE

The content of the email, phone call, or text message will often help you access if the message is legitimate. "Phishers" will usually ask you for personal information that the organisation should already have. For example, if your bank or the ATO sends you an email asking you to provide them with your bank account number and branch code, it definitely is a scam! The tone of the message may be threatening – it is designed to make you act immediately and provide your personal information.

#### **SPELLING & PUNCTUATION ERRORS**

In many cases, scams will have many errors whereas communication from a professional business is unlikely to contain spelling and punctuation errors.

#### IS IT LEGITIMATE?

Inform the organisation that you have received suspicious correspondence. Do not call the contact number on the message – rather look up the business number on their website or go into their office to ensure you are speaking with the organisation directly.

#### **WEBSITE LINKS & LOGOS**

If your gut tells you the email is suspicious, do not click on any links. Links may cause you to download malicious software, spyware or other programs that can steal your personal information.

#### YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION

Examine the address bar of the website you are visiting to find out whether the site begins with "https" rather than "http." The "https" part of the web address indicates that the website is secure. Double-click on the padlock icon in the address bar to verify that a security certificate displays on the screen. Some fictitious websites will display just an image of a padlock.

#### **EMAIL ADDRESS**

Scammers will try to trick you by using an email address that is similar to the authentic company's email address. For example, if the email address for a business ends in "group.com," a scammer may use a variation such as "trusted.group.com" to try and trick you.

#### YOUR BANK STATEMENTS

Reviewing your bank statement will allow you to detect any unauthorized charges that have been made against your account. By notifying the bank immediately, this may prevent the fraudsters from continuing to use your information.




## SPINACH AND FETA TART



#### **INGREDIENTS:**

- 250g spinach shredded
- 1 sheet short crust pastry
- 150g feta crumbled
- 3 large eggs lightly beaten (reserve 1 tablespoon)



#### **METHOD:**

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C.
- 2. Heat a large nonstick frying pan, add ¼ cup (60ml) of water and the spinach and cook gently until wilted.
- 3. Squeeze out excess liquid and set aside.
- 4. Line a 16cm round cake tin with baking paper and then the sheet of pastry.
- 5. Add the feta and beaten eggs to the spinach. Mix well and season with sea salt and cracked pepper.
- 6. Pour the mixture into the pastry case and fold the excess pastry towards the centre.
- 7. Brush the folder pastry with the reserved egg.
- 8. Bake for 40 to 45 minutes or until golden and set.


